

distributed over 50 laptops and wifi hotspots, and offered brand new academic-year programming to support students' academic and social development during the spring semester.

Heading into our 13th year of summer programming in 2020, Horizons opted for an online model that prioritized the safety of students and families while providing a high-quality academic and enrichment program to 133 students. A combination of engaging online platforms and hands-on materials delivered to families weekly allowed students to continue growing academically and rekindle their joy for learning during uncertain times. The 2020 summer concluded with Horizons hosting over 40 students for in-person outdoor classes as well as a week of swimming!

Upon surveying families, Horizons once again responded to the widening opportunity gap in the fall semester by providing after-school art classes and tutoring, which

created spaces for students to build relationships with one another and get the academic support they needed in another year of remote and hybrid learning. Throughout the year, Horizons partnered with the Dedham Food Pantry, Wegmans, Roche Bros., and many other community organizations to bring healthy and nutritious food to families at our scheduled in-person events.

Spring 2021 gave us reason to celebrate as we saw our very first group of high school seniors graduate from high school! Five of our eight graduating seniors were Kindergarteners as part of the inaugural Horizons class in 2009. Horizons is incredibly proud of their individual achievements, and we are excited to see where the next chapters of their lives take them!

Horizons looked forward to Summer 2021 as we planned to return to our in-person program. Abiding by local COVID safety guidelines, Horizons hosted 143 students on campus for a traditional

six-week summer program. The warm months were filled with learning, socialization, swimming, and even field trips!

Our ability to respond to the COVID-19 crisis is not possible without you: our local partners, our board, our staff, and our volunteers. The success of the Horizons 2020-2021 program is a testament to the strength of our ever-growing community and the belief that we can make a difference in the lives of local students and families. In these challenging times, the Horizons team is grateful for the ability to lean on our entire community for support and guidance in offering a life-changing program.

What is your connection to educational nonprofit organizations?

As a young student growing up in Hartford, CT, I was fortunate to be part of the Hartford Youth Scholars program, a catalyst program that provided additional summer and academic year rigorous preparation and support and introduced inner-city youth to independent schools. As a result, the educational opportunities that became available to me changed my life. I attended Loomis Chaffee (Windsor, CT) for four years followed by Connecticut College.

Moving to Boston in 2016, I was excited to return to the Steppingstone Foundation—a sibling program of Hartford Youth Scholars—and find myself supporting students who were

in the same position I had been, applying themselves to academic growth through consecutive summer and after-school programming.

In 2019, I joined Horizons as the Program Director and immediately built a lasting attachment to the organization's mission and community. Horizons' commitment to students and their families for ten consecutive summers is truly inspiring as the longevity of holistic support, starting at age five, has an immeasurable impact.

Now, I am thrilled to take on the role of Executive Director as the Horizons program navigates a challenging educational landscape exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic.

What do you do outside of Horizons?

Thanks to my Bosnian upbringing, you can often find me on the soccer pitch, both playing and coaching, as well as cooking in the kitchen.

Board Member Spotlight

MAX BARDEEN, BOARD CHAIR



Max Bardeen currently serves as Board Chair of Horizons at Dedham Country Day, but his relationship with Horizons started 14 years ago when his wife, Beth, sat on the board. One might say Horizons is in the family's DNA, and his relationship with the community was destined.

Max's philanthropic mindset was instilled in him as a child; thanks to his mother and her deep involvement in the community, giving back played a significant part in the family's ethos. Max grew up in Kalamazoo, Michigan, is a graduate of Lafayette College in Easton, Pennsylvania, and is

now Managing Director at UBS Financial Services. He and Beth live in Dedham and are the proud parents of two sons. We recently sat down with Max to learn more about what brought him to his seat as Board Chair; his proudest accomplishments in the role; and what excites him about the future of our community.

What has most inspired you to be the person you are today?

I attribute who I am today to my mother as she has always been a strong role model. She played such a significant part in helping me stay true to my values and set the foundation early on by leading by example, showing the importance of giving back and what it means to be a part of your community.

What life skills do you draw on to excel in your role as Board Chair?

Well, first, I am a people person. I enjoy understanding what makes people tick. There is a certain

satisfaction in applying that and the skills from the business world, however small, into the role of Board Chair. Each and every member of the Board here at Horizons believes in the mission and is truly inspired by the children, and that helps me to show up every day, too.

What led you to Horizons at Dedham Country Day School?

Initially I started as a DCD parent. My wife, Beth, was on the Board and when she resigned, a fellow Board member reached out and it was an offer I could not resist, a cause I could not refuse.

What impact has this experience had on your own life?

My role continues to heighten my awareness of the importance of closing the opportunity gap in our country. Data continues to illustrate that when children have an opportunity to learn and continue that learning through the summer



months, we can prevent a decline and summer learning loss.

What results have you seen as you have watched these students graduate from Horizons?

Graduation is one of many milestones that sticks in my mind. The pride that emanates from the children's faces brings me joy. They are so proud of their accomplishments, and you can see what it means to each one of them. The experiences they have had throughout the program build their self-esteem, and that is so evident throughout their time at Horizons but especially at graduation.

What is the number one thing that you are proud of in your role as Board Chair?

Max's philanthropic efforts do not stop with Horizons. Max also sits on the Board of Directors of the Big Sister Association of Boston; the Board of Directors of the Francis Ward Paine Foundation; and is a Member of Corporation at the Perkins School for the Blind.

It is dedicated people like Max who foster the vibrant community we have here at Horizons, and we cannot thank him and his family enough for all they do.

In the past couple of years, I am most proud of the way our community came together during COVID. We rallied and reimagined countless ways to deliver on our promise to nourish the students' minds, and I feel we were quite successful.

What are you excited to accomplish next?

I am looking forward to being in person to celebrate the past couple of years and support the students for the years ahead at the upcoming Future Bright Benefit on April 9. The community's support helps to sustain the high level of teachers and widen the audience that Horizons draws.





Our Program at a Glance

IMPROVING OUTCOMES FOR OVER A DECADE

Horizons is a tuition-free, six-week summer program that provides long-term, deep engagement to students with a broad range of academic abilities. Our award-winning, hands-on approach is designed to fuel a lifelong passion for learning, through a blend of high-quality academics, arts, sports, cultural enrichment, field trips and confidence building challenges. Horizons is a unique educational experience spanning 14 years that starts in Pre-K and extends through high school.

Horizons at Dedham Country Day is part of a nationwide network of more than 65 sites governed by and supported by Horizons National. The program at DCD has been serving students for 13 years but the first Horizons program began more than 55 years ago in New Canaan, CT.



143 Students enrolled in summer 2021 (Pre-K — 8th grade)

COVID Response Support



SPRING 2020

Schools in Greater Boston switch to remote learning.

Horizons connects families with local resources, delivers over 50 laptops and hotspots to make remote learning accessible, and offers weekly Zoom study hall and art classes.



SUMMER 2020

Horizons enrolls 133 students in a virtual five-week summer program in an effort to combat the “COVID slide” exacerbated by the pandemic.

A virtual program prioritizes access, equipping all students with weekly “Horizons at Home” material kits, STEAM projects, laptops/hotspots, and educational platforms.

Summer 2021 also focuses on family connection, with each family receiving two check-ins from teachers and staff each week to ensure they have everything they need for a successful summer program.

To end the summer, Horizons holds bi-weekly in-person classes at DCD, and also hosts an entire week of swimming to celebrate a successful summer.



ACADEMIC YEAR 2020-2021

Most students have not returned to in-person schooling or engaged in a hybrid model.

Horizons reintroduces after-school art classes and study hall, offering an engaging program for students.

Horizons offers online, teacher-led one-on-one or small group tutoring to 20 students to support the academic decline that continues because of COVID.

Horizons partners with Wegmans, Roche Bros., and The Dedham Food Pantry to offer food markets and food drives for families.

Horizons continues to host our traditional Halloween and Holiday parties to build community and bring Horizons students together.

The Horizons High School Program engages in weekly Zoom workshops to conduct virtual college visits, support college applications, set goals for the new year, and create a space for students to come together.



SUMMER 2021

Abiding by local COVID safety guidelines, Horizons resumes a traditional in-person, six-week summer program with 143 students.

Horizons addresses the need for additional Pre-K programming by offering two Pre-K classes.

Using a pod system, masking, morning COVID tracking, social distancing, and regular PPE, Horizons prioritizes COVID safety throughout the entire summer.

Students receive 3.4 hours of academic enrichment each day.

Students receive 2.4 hours of swim instruction each week.

Each class attends a combination of four on-campus and off-campus field trips throughout the summer.

Horizons hires additional social workers and deans to prioritize students’ social-emotional learning.

Horizons sees an 82% attendance rate throughout the summer, and a 95% attendance rate if filtered by COVID precaution absences.

Students continue to see 8-12 weeks of Math and Reading/ELA growth by the end of the summer.



FALL 2021

Students return to in-person learning at local schools.

Horizons continues to offer after-school art classes and teacher tutoring.

Horizons bolsters our academic-year programming by offering monthly Super Saturdays—a chance for students to come to campus for study hall as well as reconnecting with their summer peers through volunteer-led enrichment.

The Horizons High School Program continues to meet regularly and promote student growth through workshops, partnerships, and college access.





Summer 2020 and 2021 expanded to offer both on and off-campus field trips offering over 40 unique and exciting hands-on visits to a variety of historical, cultural, and scientific venues throughout Greater Boston.



